BANK'S PROGRESS.

October 'Opening Times' reported the rumour that Wilsons had sold about ten of their pubs to a Wolverhampton based Brewery.

November "What's Brewing" says that four Wilso ns Houses have been bought: The Gransmoor in Openshaw and the Gorton Brook, West Gorton - both South Manchester Branch Pubs - the Gransmoor has been closed for some time, and the Gorton Brook has only recently closed. The other two are the Mitchell Arms, Ancoats, and Osborne House, Collyhurst, both in the North Manchester Branch Area; another two Wilsons pubs may be bought later.

The new 'Longsight' in Kirkmanshulme Lane is now well advanced (the roof is on) and signs say it is due to open at Christmas.

As Bank's brew an excellent Mild, it will be interesting to see how this goes down with Manchester drinkers, who are not really renowned for drinking large quantities of Mild. There has been a steady decline over the years in the amount of cask mild available - as demand goes down, size of container is reduced, but then as turnowver falls even further, the beer goes off before it can be sold, and the inevitable happens - Keg mild takes over.

Will Banks's be able to reverse this trend?

It's a very different picture in their trading area in the Midlands - there are even some 'Mild only' pubs.

Pub of the Month for December is the Kings' Head, Chancellor Lane, Ardwick - Chancellor Lane is the road that links Ashton Old Road and Hyde Road, close to the Bus depot, so it's easy to get to.

It's not that long since John & Josie Sullivan took over the tenancy, but they've already considerably increased the popularity of the pub, situated as it is in an area with many pubs chasing not that much trade. The only cask beer is Greenalls Bitter, and many CAMRA members have commented of the high quality here of a beer that does'nt normally rank among CAMRAs favourites. To complement the improving trend inside the pub, it is currently receiving a smart new coat of paint (should all be finished by presentation night)

John learned much of his craft at the Manchester Arms, Stockport, where we had a memorable Pub of the Month in May, and while I can't promise a Moon-shot from under the railway arches, I'm sure it'll be a night to enjoy - the date to remember is Thursday, December 20th. The Church Inn, Ardwick Green, is currently closed for renovations, and is expected to reopen in early December. It is expected to re-emerge still as a recognisable pub.


IRISH LOSS

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CHANGE AT VICTORIA.

It all started back in May, when the off-licence next to the Victoria in Withington closed, as it was to become part of the pub. A temporary partition wall appeared, but otherwise life seemed to go on much as usual.

Then, in mid-September, the new bar opened for business - it was much larger than the old bar, and illuminated 'pladtic-box' dispensers had replaced the old plunger type. The beer itself, of course, remained completely unaltered excellent cask conditioned Hydes' Mild & Bitter at 60p and 64p a pint.

Work then strarted an the old Vault and Bar area, and by early November the alterations were almost complete. but although the new carpet was down, the curtains were still missing.

There are several interesting features about this conversion, firstly although it is now a one-price pub (the vault was originallt 1p cheaper) by no means is it a totally boring one bar pub by use of existing walls, and new wooden screens, there are now two distinct and different 'sitting' areas, a Games Room (replacing the Vault) & there is still plenty of room for those who prefer to prop up the bar (and 'bum-rail' if you want to lean in the opposite direction)

Secondly during all these quite considerable alterations the pub has never closed, so how can you have an official Opening night? There is a date - 20th., November but as this has passed another date to note is 17th., December- you are assured of a decent pint in pleasant surroundings but it should be an evening with a difference - come along and find out why.

RED REVOLUTION.

Last months 'Opening Times' reported that a Pedigree Handpump had appeared in the Red Lion, Withington, and more were to follow. The conversion from the old metered dispense is now complete and Mercian Mild and Burton Bitter have joined the Pedigree, at 65p, 67p & 72p a pint respectively.

The Bar staff at this very busy pub may be taking a little time to get used to the new-fangled pumps - a too energetic first pull by an enthusiastic barman and everyone at the bar got some of my mild!

R.I.P. GRAFTON

Sadly, the Grafton Arms, Grafton Street, Chorlton-on-Medlock, which was an institution among students, hospital workers and general boozers alike, is to be demolished at Christmas.

This pub has been in the CAMRA national Good Beer Guide for several years, but has unfortunately decayed in recent times since Holts Brewery have refused to spend any money on ig. A new pub is to be erected on the site, and should be completed by next November, but how can a bland, modern estate pub replace a characterful local which, although built at the end of the last Century, had such wonderful modern inovations as a stuffed mallardy a hideous '60s style clock which virtually covered the whole wall in the smoke room, 'gold' records above the jukebox and the biggest, noisiest electronic clay pigeon shooting machine in the known universe (mercifully this last item was usually out of order).

And who could possibly replace the dulcet tones of the lovely Dorothy ('Dot' to her muckers) who sang out the orders at lunch times for hot pies and mushy peas in a voice that was lethal at 100 paces?

Ah, life just is nt going to be the same in future.

During a recent visit into deepest Hertfordshire, a call at the GEG Euffalo's Head at Puckeridge revealed that in addition to Benskins Bitter (its a tied house) Victorias Albert was also on sale. Benskins BLO Jim Axford gave some more information on the situatiom. The pub took part in a Benskins guest beer trial, taking several Allied cask beers in rotation for two months each, and it also stocks, on a regular basis, beers from the Victoria Brewery at Ware.

The onthusiastic landlord (a CAMRA member) seems to have been able to persuade Benskins to support his 'bulk beer' policy, but it's thought to be a 'one off' as Jim does'nt know of another pub in the Benskins estate which is allowed to take a true additional/ guest beer. Another Allied gust beer trial was due to start in September, involving about 100 pubs.

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
