

# ROUND BRITAIN DRINKER. The Scottish Highlands.

Unfortunately, the majestic and magnifident scenic splendour of the Scottish Highlands is almost without exception infested with some of the most insipid, inninspiring, boring BR Buffet-type licensed premises in the known universe! However, cask-conditioned beer is gradually becoming more widely available, albeit incredibly slowly outside of Glasgow & Edinburgh.

Nonetheless, anyone who intends to spend a holiday in the Highland Region in the next few months might benefit from the following list of real ale outlets which were visited this summer.

ONICH (Near Fort William - visited 23/6/85)

Craig Dhu Hotel (Main Rd. A82) - large plush hotel with small cocktail bar. Expensive. McEwans 80/- (H) 90p - very warm butvgood flavour. Alice Ale (H) 90p - On trial basis. Not

available on the night of my visit. <u>Onich Hotel</u> (Main Rd. A82) Smart tourist Hotel. Excellent views of Loch Linnhe from rear lounge and/or Beer Garden. Arrolls 70/- (H) 80p - bit warm, bit flat, bit bland! Burton Ale (H) 90p - bit warm, bit flat, reasonable flavour.

FORT WILLIAM (2/7/85)

Nevis Bank Hotel (Belford Road) Huge modern hotel at north end of town with cask beer in bar and lounge. McEwans 80/- (H) 80p - very good Youngers No. 3 (H) 80p - reasonable. Ben Nevis Hotel (High Street) Lively bar on main shopping Street. Beware of "£1 notes" partly concealed under bar towels. Youngers No. 3 (H) 77p - good.

DINGWALL (24/6/85)

National Hotel (Viking Lounge) Modern lounge bar in large hotel at end of main street. Youngers No. 3 (H) 85p - slightly cold, but good condition and flavour.

THURSO (26/6/85)

Central Hotel (Traill Street) Modern Hotel lounge. Youngers No. 3 (H) 85p - cold and gassy. Possible top/blamket pressure. Station Bar (Princes Street)

Superb, traditional, unspoilt gem with much wood panelling and original Bass, Youngers, Campbells & Aitchison mirrors, Used to bottle 'draught' No. 3 underneath the pub until 1958. A must!! McEwans 80/- (A) 83p - good. Youngers No. 3 (A) - 83p - excellent. <u>Marine Bar</u> (Old Town harbour area) Closed at the time of my visit but outside windows with stickers claiming cask conditioned McEwans 80/- & Youngers No. 3.

ISLE OF SKYE - Portree (1/7/85) <u>Caledonian Hotel</u> (Wentworth Street) Upstairs, young peoples bar with prominent juke box. Herriots 80/- (H) 80p - warm but reasonable.

## INVERGARRY (2/7/85)

- Arther

<u>Inn on the Garry</u> - Main Road A87. Attractive sandstone exterior with disappointing bistro bar at side. Arrolls 70/- (?) - not available. Burton Ale (H) - 93p warm but reasonable flavour.

It should be fairly obvious to most people intending to visit these pubs that they should line their pockets with a consderable wad of notes beforw embarking on this 1,600 mile pub crawl.

Those wishing further information on additional real ale outlets north of the border should consult "Real Ale in Scotland", published by the Scottish Branches of CAMRA.



The Rising Sun, a Pennine Host pub, has recently undergone internal alterations which, believe it or not, actually imroves the appearance of the pub. A small dining room has been extended further into the pub by utilising a corridor which was previously unused.

One can only hope that Pennine don't decide to convert it into one of their theme pubs in a couple of years time!

The bad news, though, is that the mild is now keg.

The Horse and Mockey, Wilsons, now also sells keg mild.

The alterations to the Bird in Hand, Robinsons, have eventually been completed and although the outsome is the usual bland, boring identikit pub, it must be looked upon as a vast improvement.

The Fallowfield, Fal owfield (surprise, surprise) now sells Wilsons Handpumped mild alongside the bitter.

The Ducie Arms on Plymouth Grove, Longsight, will hopefully be selling cask Chesters Bitter on handpump by the time we go to print.

## Kipling on the A6

The Bar of the refurbished Rudyard Hotel on the main drag through Heaton Chapel now sells Handpumped Stones Bitter (78p & the only real Stones in our area) and Bass (82p). The typical Big Six upmarket interior does its best to live up to the exterior colonnades - not most peoples' idea of a down-to-earth local, but a welcome new real ale outlet nevertheless.

We understand Marie will be returning to her 'home territory' of Heaton Mersey so, while hoping to bump into her over a pint at the Griffin, CAMRA extends sincere good wishes for a happy and well-earned retirement.

#### ON THE RIGHT LINES?

A reliable source tells us that the Railway, Pottery Lane, opposite Ashburys Station, should soon be selling Boddingtins Bitter. Probably not by the time you read this, since some cellar work needs to be done, but it'll be good to see real ale return to this former Bass (and earlier Openshaw Brewery) tied house which sold cask Bass beers until 1980 or so.

#### VIVE LA LONGSIGHT!

You just can't keep the Longsight out of the news! Latest wheeze, in mid-July, was a French Fortnight (to celebrat Bastille Day?), which saw the barmaids resplendent in red berets and a menu boasting such delights as 'Cotelettes de Porc Poivrade a la Creme'. Perhaps more to the point, the beer maintained it's usual good form for the festivities.

## TERMINATED SHORT

Pennine Hosts Railway, Didsbury Road, Heaton Mersey, appears to have lost the handpumped Websters Bitter it re-opened with, leaving handpumped Wilsons Bitter at 70p as the only real ale.

#### THE PLOUGH - AN APOLOGY.

In our last issue we reported that the **Plough**, Shaw Heath (Wilsons) was to reopen after alterations with keg only beers.

We are advised by the licensee that this is not the case and that after cellar improvements Cask Wilsons Beers will be available. Full report next month and our apologies for this error.

## AROUND IN THE TOWN - Mongsight and Levenshulme.

What follows is not intended to be a statement of the quality of thepubs or beer on all occasions, but is our opinion of both on the night of the crawl,

This was definitely a crawl which degenerated throughout its duration. A fine early start was made at 6pm at the Longsight, Much has already been said of this place, it's only fault seems to be the fact that it's new! At 6-30 the early starters joined the crawl proper at thw Wagon & Horses. The beer was a good average in this large Hosts pub. It would seem to be rice for 'treatment'. The managers from the Midnay have recently moved here and their pile of Pennies certificate is on the wall, so don't worry you're not in the wrong pub! A quick check in the Ducie established that Chesters Bitter was to be on by Wednesday of Thursday, 5th./6th. July. Thenoon to the Bay Horse, a modern Boddies and start carraigning, Much of the pub. The beer was good, the pub uninspiring.

The Crown came next, yet another Host house this time blessed with a "Take 2" illuminated sign above the bar which was totally out of keeping with the pub. The beer was good, but nothing to write home about. The Garrett was eagerly looked forward to by all present, its mest notable feature being the price of the Drabs (Helts' for the uninitiated;) The beer was O.K., in fact one of our number waxed dyrical on its excellence, I suppose no one's perfect! We met with an uninteresting sight here, a white 'cow' that has to be seen to be believed Those laziest amongst us cadged a lift to the next stop, the Polygon, a bitter only Boddies pub. A quiet, comfortable pub with reasonable beer.

The return to Wilsons Land was begun by the Horseshoe, where the beer was quite reasonable, but far too cold, Jim dropped his beer and had the cheek to blame a slippery glass! Finally the crawl returned to Stockport Road and the home run(! First on the straight was the Levenshulme, a run of the mill bitter only pub, managed by the ubiquitous Host group. Next came another Host house, the Pack Horse, again Bitter only where the only interesting feature was the glasses. A great pity the bitter was'nt as interesting as the glasses!

Only three to go from here, the firtst being the Union, a Boddies house where improvements Cover Wilsons Bears Will

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the bitter acheived a spread of opinion ranging from excellent to little better than undrinkable. The prevailing opinion seemed to lean to the former. Our pecultimate port of call was the Fermers Arms where handpumped Chesters (I think) was available. Doubt was expressed over the quality of the beer, and Rhys left most of his pint undrunk! The ultimate destination was ultimate in more ways than one.! The Midway is a recent 'conversion' by Rosts. The Beer was extremely poor, there were unwashed glasses everywhere, and the pub was packed to the door, Perhaps the place is best summed up by a little comario observed by us:

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Bounder/Doorman: "Hope to see you again" Deporting Girl: "I doubt it"




## PUB GRUB.

This Month features a pub in a more out of the way area - the Travellers Call on Ashton Old Road. Previously run-down and even closed for a time, this had now been converted into a comfortable, thriving free house serving Boddies & Thwaites beers on excellent form (the Thwaites Bitter was particularly good on my visit). This is a heavily pubbed area so it was quite a gamble to take on the pub but is certainly seems to have paid off with a good trade at lunchtimes and at night (quite an acheivement these days).

Also unusual, and again enterprising, is that food is available early evening from 5.30 - 9pm as well as lunchtimes.

The menu consists of a wide variety of set dishes ranging from sandwiches to dishes like Cumberland sausages & Pork chop or Gammon & Pineapple at about £2.20 each. In addition each day sees about 4 specials, one usually being home made soup (eg potato & leek), and the others more substantial including, on my visit, meat & potato pie, steak & onions in beer, and tandoori chicken, all accompanied by chips, vegetables (not wanned) and salads as appropriate. The main specials were £1.75 each & I chose the steak & onions in beer which turned out to be excellent. The steak was surprisingly tender & the sauce, a although thin, was really tasty. The chips looked home made & the vegetables (peas & carrots) were the best I've had in a pub for a long time (they actually tasted of something!) Portions are generous but if you are a real pig there's gateau & cheesecake to finish of with.

Definately worth a visit. If you are in Manchester and want somewhere a bit



different for lunch Buses 118, 119, 120 & 121 from Piccadully will drop you off nea near the pub (it's just before Grey Mare Lane) Try it and see.

Footnote: For all 'OT' readers travelling to the West Midlands a good place to eat is the Brewery Inn at Oldbury (Brewery tap of Holt, Plant & Deakin, an Allied Brewery Company). They produce mammoth double decker butties for an incredible 65p!

#### BRIDGE THAT GAP!

Stockports latest Frehouse, the Bridgewater on Chester gate, has meplaced Wilsons Mild with Websters Green Label. It was on excellent form when sampled - with the added attraction of being available at a cut down price of 63p from Monday, 5th., August.

Seen in the Toilet! - In the Public bar Gents of the Mitre, Greenwich: "Hand Washing facilities are available in the saloon bar toilet." ? We know Londoners are supposed to be class-conscious, but this is ridiculous**II** 

#### BURTONWOOD KEG KAPERS

A recent 'What's Doing' mentioned that the handpumps at Wigans' Royal Oak were not dispensing cask conditioned ale.

Another sneaky trick from Burtonwood has now come to light, in the Black Lion at Llanfaethlen, Anglesey (a GBG Pub). The pump clips on both Mild & Bitter pumps say 'cask-conditioned', but the mild is not. (The price list gives a clur, they're both 70p). The mild is surprisingly palatable (probably because the CO2 pressure is kept very low) but apart from being completely misleading for unsuspecting drinkers, it is a blatant breach of Trade Descriptions. This was politely pointed out to the Licensee - sticky tape over 'Cask Conditioned' was suggested as a temporary measure, but so far no action has been taken.

The Waldorf in Manchester Centre is at present undergoing extensive alterations which have involved the demolition of the entire front of the pub. Having failed to find a purchaser, Whitbreads have decided that drastic action is necessary to make the pub pay although it remains to be seen whether this invludes keeping any of the previous characer & traditional beer. Watch this space for a further report after re-opening.


